During public comments, several residents criticized actions recently taken by the council to limit parking at informal trailheads. Banta said that parking near the trailheads is impacting the quality of life for residents who live nearby. Green-Sinnard pointed out that in some cases the hikers' vehicles were creating a safety issue by potentially blocking emergency vehicles. Cressman said he was seeking a clear statement from the Forest Service about the

trailheads.


# Lewis-Palmer School District 38 Staff Spotlight: Dr. Jessica Miller


