### The Rabbi's Corner The Calendar

On October 31, 1517 Martin Luther attached his ninety-five theses to the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg, Germany, thus giving birth to what is known today as the Protestant Reformation, and his official break with the Catholic Church in Rome. His followers embraced the calendar developed by Pope Gregory the XIII (known as the Gregorian calendar), during the late 1500's, thus embracing holidays and celebrations totally foreign to those given by YHWH to his people Israel. Example of such celebrations are: Halloween, Christmas, St. Patrick's Day, St. Valentine's Day, St. John's Day, St. Peter's Day, Easter, Ascension, and All Saints Days.

Unfortunately today, sincere believers desiring to follow God observe these celebrations without question and are ignorant of the calendar and holidays given by God, to be observed by His followers. They observe their faith and commitment to Messiah yet, they do not observe the holidays that He observed. On the other side of the coin, there is a move of the spirit of God planting in people's hearts a hunger or desire to learn what the actual instructions of God are and what His Torah teaches.
